





Addendum 1

In American society, the heart usually means our emotions. Biblically, the term is much richer. Elyse Fitzpatrick's book *Idols of the Heart: Learning to Long for God Alone* shows that the heart consists of our mind (thoughts, beliefs, understandings, memories, judgments, conscience, and discernment), affections (longings, desires, feelings, imaginations, and emotions), and will (the part of us that chooses what actions we take). Thus the heart is the inner person. The will is especially important when studying forgiveness from the heart. Consider the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant in <u>Matthew 18:21-35</u>.

Then Peter came and said to Him (Jesus), "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me and I forgive him? Up to seven times?"

Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you, up to seven times, but up to seventy times seven.

"For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he had begun to settle them, one who owed him ten thousand talents (billions of dollars) was brought to him. But since he did not have the means to repay, his lord commanded him to be sold, along with his wife and children and all that he had, and repayment to be made. So the slave fell to the ground and prostrated himself before him, saying, 'Have patience with me and I will repay you everything.' And the lord of that slave felt compassion and released him and forgave him the debt. But that slave went out and found one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii (days' wages); and he seized him and began to choke him, saying, 'Pay back what you owe.' So his fellow slave fell to the ground and began to plead with him, saying, 'Have patience with me and I will repay you.' But he was unwilling and went and threw him in prison until he should pay back what was owed. So when his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were deeply grieved and came and reported to their lord all that had happened. Then summoning him, his lord said to him, 'You wicked slave, I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not also have had mercy on your fellow slave, in the same way that I had mercy on you?' And his lord, moved with anger, handed him over to the torturers until he should repay all that was owed him.

"My heavenly Father will also do the same to you, if each of you does not forgive his brother from your heart." (NASB-95)

From this parable, we see that forgiveness always costs the forgiver. Forgiving us cost Jesus His life! Likewise, in God's economy, unforgiveness always costs the un-forgiver (Matthew 6:15).

Then what does biblical forgiveness look like? Jay Adams in the Christian Counselor's Manual states that if I forgive you, I am making three promises.

1. I promise not to bring the matter up again to use against you. God's example is that He remembers our sin no more (<u>Jeremiah 31:34</u>; <u>Hebrews 8:12</u>, <u>10:17</u>). He does not forget, but He chooses not to call the sin to mind.

- 2. I promise not to bring up the matter to anyone else against you. This is a promise not to commit the sin of gossip (Romans 1:29; 1 Timothy 5:13).
- 3. I promise not to dwell on the matter. When we keep turning something painful over in our minds, we are likely to become bitter, which is sin (<u>Ephesians 4:31</u>).

Each of these promises is a matter of the will, not emotions. We choose them to please and glorify God (1 Corinthians 10:31), to obey God because in Christ He has forgiven us (Ephesians 4:31-32), and to bless the one forgiven. However, these promises do not address the powerful emotions we may feel that scream against forgiving. Simply telling ourselves, "Don't feel that way!" will not help. Instead, since reaching full forgiveness can be a process, we add two more promises.

- 4. When the feelings of pain come to mind, I promise to act as if I have forgiven (because I have), to remind myself of the first three promises, and then to redirect my thinking according to Philippians 4:8, i.e., to what is true, right, noble, pure, etc.
- 5. I promise to treat you as if the sin never happened. (Such kindness does not preclude possible consequences, e.g., an abusive spouse going to jail for crimes committed, or a child forfeiting a desired opportunity. Forgiveness implies commitment to pursue reconciliation to the extent possible. Reconciliation requires that forgiveness occurs first.)

By these two promises, I acknowledge that the pain is real and I reaffirm the first three promises. At first, this can be very difficult, but by making it a habit, in time my emotions will let go of the pain, anger, and other negative feelings that attended the situation. Later, I may even "forget."

When should we forgive? Twice, the passage shows expressing forgiveness upon the other person's confession or promise to make up for the matter. What if the other person refuses to confess, or cannot? In such a case, do we fail to forgive? No, in light of Matthew 6:15, we should not hold back. God does give us some options.

- If we can overlook a sin so that it does not keep coming to mind (<u>Proverbs 19:11</u>), we can simply forgive it as a private transaction with God. But if the other keeps repeating the offense, we need to address it for the sake of the other's sanctification.
- If it is a deeper wound, we may still be limited to the private transaction. Suppose, for example, that the person has died?
- Before we address the situation, we must first take the log out of our own eye
 (Matthew 7:1-5), confessing our own sins. If the offender is available, we gently
 address the matter privately (Matthew 18:15). A helpful opening would describe the
 situation and ask if we did something to cause offense leading to the other's action. If
 an unbeliever rejects the approach, we may have to drop it. With a believer in
 Christ, Matthew 18:15-20 applies.

- Between spouses, the husband should be first to humble himself, confess, and ask forgiveness, for he is to model godly leadership for his wife, including confession of sin (<u>Ephesians 5:25</u>; <u>Luke 9:23</u>). If he refuses, his wife should take the initiative in obedience to Christ. Perhaps the Spirit will use her obedience to motivate him. (But beware, abusers usually interpret such initiative as weakness and as license to continue abusing. Dealing with abuse is a separate topic.)
- If I am the recipient of this approach, I must take it seriously and not brush it off or turn
 it against the other as his or her problem—how would that be like Christ? Nor may I
 demand that the other "get over it," a self-serving response, but repent.

Suppose someone sins, confesses, repents, receives forgiveness, and keeps repeating the pattern. If we raise the issue, are we violating the first promise? Not if we aim to help that one replace the sinful habit with a godly one (<u>Ephesians 4:22-24</u>). We could open with, "I am concerned about a pattern in your life and where it is leading." Be prepared for resistance and calmly state that you want to help.

The promises are profound, costly, and NOT optional. "Forgive us our debts (sins) as we also have forgiven our debtors" (Matthew 6:12). If we refuse to forgive, what have we prayed against ourselves?

Is this kind of forgiveness too difficult? If so, then we realize that genuine forgiveness from the heart is both an act of the will and supernatural. If not, we have probably been practicing biblical forgiveness for some time. In either case, we all need the Holy Spirit's help to live out God's kind of forgiveness toward others. If we ask, He will be pleased to help us do it.

If we willingly practice forgiveness from the heart in the little things, including gently addressing matters with offenders, we will please God and grow more like Christ. In addition, God will strengthen our "forgiveness muscle" for greater potential tests. Our graciousness may even avert some possible trials—God alone knows. Further, God will equip us through our faithful obedience to help others through their trials calling for forgiveness (1 Corinthians 1:3-4). Let's all choose to forgive biblically!

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Addendum 2 The Secret to a Holy Marriage (By Van Johnson)

Solicited or not, many engaged or young married couples hear at some point a variation of the phrase, "the secret to a happy marriage is..." followed by any number of possible answers from those older couples in their lives. Some answers are obviously better than others as they are evaluated in light of God's Word, and there is no doubt all offerings are well intended. One of my favorite exercises in marriage counseling is to ask couples what they themselves would offer as "the secret." Their responses typically yield some valuable insights to their own hearts' values. This conversation also gives me the opportunity to bring some clarity and instruction from God's Word into the relationship.

Holy vs. Happy

When couples seek counseling, they often assume the common objective I have for them is a happy marriage, a good marriage. While this is not a sinful objective and they are not necessarily wrong to assume this, the question we must ask from the Bible is whether or not this is *God's* objective for their marriage. I have found Romans 8:28-29 to be immensely helpful in clarifying the right objective, as clearly within these verses we find God's definition of good—not only for marriage, but for all of life for every believer. In this passage, Paul defines good as our holiness, conformity to the image of Christ. The first question couples must ask themselves is *whose* definition of good they are using for their lives and their marriage. This can be incredibly impactful, because often the truthful answer is *their own definition*, not the *Lord's*. Helping them to understand that our loving Father has in mind for them a lifelong process, their sanctification, reframes every aspect of the relationship, for certainly the "all things" of Romans 8:28 includes their spouse. God's objective of Christlikeness is far greater than even the noblest worldly pursuits they may have set for themselves. When we are able to move from talking about the secret to a happy marriage to talking about the secret to a holy marriage, real progress is being made.

Pride vs. Humility

We must turn to God's Word to understand what it looks like practically to seek a holy marriage. One passage that helps us do just that is Philippians 2:3-4. Marriage as a sanctifying relationship does more to reveal individual pride than virtually anything else in life. The lowliness of mind to which we are all commanded in these verses is perhaps most immediately given the opportunity for expression when we look to our spouse. Particularly for couples in crisis, it becomes clear that at some point they began to forget that the most significant "other" they are to esteem in their lives is their spouse. The key is helping the couple move from humility as an abstract principle to concrete action. A favorite example of mine is to point out that all but the most cowardly husband, when given the opportunity, would lay down his life willingly for his wife. When this opportunity comes in the form of taking out the trash at the wife's request when it is late at night in sub-zero weather because the next day is garbage day however, reluctance creeps in. The call from Philippians 2:3-4 is to exercise humility towards one another even in the humblest of circumstances. If there be any resistance to this, or skepticism as to its direct relationship to Christlikeness, the beautiful illustration of this principle at work is in verses 5-11,

as we see this lowliness of mind fully displayed in our Savior. For Him, the embrace of humility was quite literally decades of obedience to the will of His Father—the overwhelming majority of which we do not even have recorded for us in Scripture. If the Son of God would walk this path, giving us a living example, before enabling us to do the same through His sacrificial death, how could we be unwilling to follow?

My Secret

If it has not become clear already, my answer to the question of the "secret to a happy marriage" is humility. To the extent couples will focus on being humble towards one another, other important elements such as love, communication, and patience will inevitably follow. This is not my promise, it is the promise of the God who guarantees the good works He has begun in us will be faithfully completed (Philippians 1:6). His work in us, and the hope for any married couple, is that we will be like *Christ* when He is done with us. Better than any cultural conception of happiness, this is the beauty of a holy marriage.

Respectful Submission: The Role of Wives

Ways A Wife May Express Respectful Submission To Her Husband

(How to convince your husband that you love him)

Evaluate the way you express love to your husband. Go over the list and circle the ways you are neglecting. Ask your husband to go over the list and put a check mark in front of the ways he would like you to express love. Ask him to add other things to the list.

You may express love to your husband

- 1. Greet him at the door with a smile, a hug, a kiss, and a kind expression like, "I am glad to see you. I really missed you today."
- 2. Having a cup of coffee, tea or cold drink ready for him when he comes home.
- 3. Give him a lingering kiss
- 4. Let him know you like to be with him and organize ways to spend time with him
- 5. Be willing to talk to him about his concerns and not belittling him about them



Conference Table

In this document, 'he" can be "he" or "she."

Meet every day if necessary

- Meet at a table (writing can be done, harder to walk away, time needed to get to the table)
- The table becomes a symbol of hope
- Gives time for families to meet together and talk over the day's problems.

Rules of the Conference Table

Rule 1: Ephesians 4:25-32 is read aloud FIRST

Rule 2: At this table he discusses the problem in terms of his own responses to them (first setting right his own failure). This takes the log out of his eye according to Matthew 7:1-5.

- If he has been jealous, how he has felt bitter, how he has acted spitefully, how he has been angry, etc.
- He may also mention wrongs done toward others outside the home and may seek advice and help on how to best deal with them.
- He admits his own sins first and asks for forgiveness and help. This helps avoid similar problems in the future.

Rule 3: The offended party grants forgiveness based on Ephesians 4:32 and offers to help.

- Part of the help given may be some accountability actions on behalf of the other person.
- As he talks about himself and directs attention to his own failures, fears and sins, communication opens up.
- If he begins by confronting someone else at the table, a clash may occur. This cannot happen!
- When members of a family begin to confess sins to one another, they find that they can ask for and receive the help they need.
- Confession and forgiveness allows you to shift the focus from the person to the problem.

Rule 4: The conference table does not exist in order to tell others off.

Rule 5: Speak the truth, but always in love, and always with the intention of getting help.

Read back through Ephesians 4:25-32

Other Notes:

- If the rules are broken, a prearranged signal happens by someone recognizing that the standard of this passage is not being held and simply stands up.

- When someone stands up, the other participant recognizes that a rule was broken.
- If the one who is seated finds himself in the wrong, he immediately should say something like, "I understand what you're saying. Please sit down, let's talk about the problem instead of arguing and getting upset. Will you forgive me?"

This is not natural and will seem awkward for a few weeks. But, many things you've accomplished were awkward at first: riding a bike, ice skating, driving stick, etc...

This is part of not letting the sun go down on your anger.
